# Turton and Edgworth Primary School - PE Action Plan and Sport Premium Funding Report 2023 - 2024

## What is the Sports Premium Funding?

In April 2013, the Government announced new funding of £150 million for physical education (PE) and sport. Schools are free to determine how best to use this funding for additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport which will benefit primary aged pupils. This includes increasing participation in PE and sport so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

In March 2023 there was a major Government funding announcement & commitment to PE and school sport The package, outlined below, will help to boost equal opportunities in PE and school sport both inside and outside the classroom.

## The full package includes:

Over £600 million across this and the next academic years (2023-24 & 2024-25) for the continuation of the Primary PE and Sport Premium – a funding commitment to improve the quality of PE and sports in primary schools to help children benefit from regular activity

Schools to deliver a minimum 2 hours of curriculum PE – with more support being offered through a refreshed School Sport Action Plan

£22 million for two years of further funding for the School Games Organiser network (SGO) – Annually the 450 strong SGO workforce supports 2.2m participation opportunities for children including 28,000 competitive school sport events

Equal access to sports in school – setting out that offering girls and boys the same sports, where it is wanted is the new standard









Up to £57 million funding for the 'Open Sports Facilities' programme – to open up more school sport facilities outside of school hours especially targeted at girls, disadvantaged pupils and pupils with special educational needs

A new digital reporting tool for Primary PE and Sport Premium – to support schools in using the funding to the best advantage of their pupils

Expansion of the Schools Games Mark – to reward parity of provision for girls

At Turton and Edgworth, we provide all pupils with a high quality, physical exercise program delivered as part of our IMPACT curriculum. We teach pupils the importance of exercise and the impact this has on their health and well-being. We understand the impact a healthy and happy personality can have on a pupil's achievements. In addition, we offer pupils the opportunity to participate in a variety of extra-curricular clubs including, multi-skills, dodgeball, football, netball and dance. We aim to provide pupils with the opportunity to experience sports that they have not experienced before.

At Turton Edgworth, we also provide pupils with the opportunity to take part in various sporting competitions. Pupils have participated in a number of competitions organised by class teachers, DPSSA and community sports organisations. The pupils taking part are encouraged to develop a positive attitude to competitions entered, learning about perseverance and determination to succeed, skills which can easily be transferred to their other academic studies.

### Aims

- To continue to use the Sports Premium Funding effectively to raise the outcomes for children by ensuring that each pupil has access to high quality PE provision and that they engage in regular physical activity
- To ensure that every child has at least 30 minutes of daily physical activity (DPA) every day through active break times. PE, extra-curricular clubs, active lessons, or other sport and physical activity events
- To develop a vision that recognises that by the time each child leaves Turton and Edgworth they will have become positive in their approach to physical activity, achieved personal success and developed a sense of pride that provides them with the confidence to try new experiences through the next stages of their life.

## **Objectives**

- 1. All pupils have access to high quality PE provision and are given the opportunity to participate in a range of extra-curricular sports clubs (supported by School Sport Premium Funding (SSPF).
- 2. The school accesses the full provision of coaching opportunities offered by the Darwen Schools' Sports Partnership through use of SSPF.
- 3. The school takes advantage of the partnership with community sports providers e.g. Blackburn Rovers to increase participation across all sports and activities (supported by SSPF).
- 4. All pupils will have at least 30 minutes of daily physical activity (DPA) every day through active break times, PE, extra-curricular clubs, active lessons, or other sport and physical activity events.
